A Family Devoted

My mother Evelyn Gallant has been a Resident of Rocmaura Nursing Home for the past 6 years. She is 92 and still going strong.

Mom was born December 18, 1923 and lived in Rogersville & Adamsville, NB before coming to Saint John. She married in 1945 and had us children Joan, Jerry, Barbara, Kenny & Judy. Life was not easy for mom, a single mother of 5 small children when it wasn't fashionable to be without a husband. We lived on King St. West and life was difficult for her. She worried constantly about putting food on the table and keeping us safe and loved.

Despite her difficulties she was extremely strong and hardworking. Mom was the first person I know who recycled, way before the word was ever used. She could make anything and stretch a dollar a long way. She was an amazing knitter which kept us in warm socks, mittens, sweaters & hats. She could make a tasty meal out of a turnip and onion and her baking and cooking skills were delicious.

We were the only things that mattered and she was determined to bring us up with values and respect. We were brought up in the Catholic religion and we all spent many days in the Assumption Church on the west side. Mom made sure we all went to school (St. Patrick's) and she had rules that we tried never to break.

Mom always said to me, even though life was difficult when we were small, it was the happiest time of her life.

We moved to town when I was in grade 5 and things began to get a bit easier for mom. She got a job at MRA's department store on King Street serving tea to employees on their breaks. Eventually she got a job on the

floor and sold sweaters. As we started to grow and leave the nest, mom got a job with Irving Oil. She spoke fluent French (even though she never finished school because she had to quit in grade 9 to help in the family home,) she was smart and stayed there until she retired at 65.

Mom was devoted to volunteering at St. Joseph's Hospital, and her beloved Cathedral on Waterloo St. was her love. She never faltered in her beliefs and religion. She was very strict and resourceful, and loves her family more than anything in this world.

Mom now has 12 grandchildren, 2 step grandchildren, 11 great grandchildren, 3 step great grandchildren, and 2 great great grandchildren. I know deep in her mind she remembers us as small children running around and playing. We are so blessed to be in her life and love her and thank her for the continued love and support she has given us so we could have a better life.
